

It is used in the Old Testament story of Abraham sacrificing his only son Isaac. Obviously God didn't TEMPT Abraham to sacrifice Isaac. Clearly it was a supreme TEST of the loyalty of Abraham. God didn't and can't try to seduce into sin.

Metal is tested far beyond any strain or stress it will ever be called upon to endure: likewise, man - and woman - have to be tested before God can use them for his own purposes.

What we call temptation is not meant to make us sin: it is meant to enable us to conquer sin. It is not meant to weaken us: it is meant to make us emerge stronger and finer and purer from the ordeal.

The incident that you read in today's gospel is not so much the <u>TEMPTING</u> as the <u>TESTING of Jesus</u>. So ... during Lent you are being tested - and the Jews had a saying: "God does not elevate a man to dignity until he has first tried and somehod him.

IMPRESSIONS

Two years ago while carrying out her works of charity as an agent for the four hundred club; Sheila Wright told me a very moving story of how there were very few volunteers for thenew Parish Council and how worried Father Peyton was about what to do if no more names were forthcoming. Neatly sidestepping my question as to why she was not volunteering her self, she did manage to persuade me to allow her to propose my name. The only condition I laid down was that if there was, infact a sudden last minute rush of volunteers(in response to similar heart-rending tales of woe told by other '400 Club'agents), I would be allowed to withdraw my name without having to go through the embarassment of losing my deposit in the ensuing election. (As you will no doubt have glanced at the name at the end of this article and said to yourself "I wonder who he is?" you will already have proved my point in this).

Two years later my term of office is up and I would like to give you a few impressions of what it was like serving on the Council and the way in which it functions.

At the first meeting all members were asked which of the various sub - committees they would like to serve on There were five of these; Projects, Liturgy, Youth, Welfare and Social. I volunteered to join Projects team mainly out of curiosity to find out what it was.

After the first twelve months I was not really any wiser than when I started The Chairman of this group left the Parish after about a month and all our good intentions left with her. The idea was that each sub-committee met between each meeting of the full Parish Council and then reported what they had done, what help they needed for future activities etc. at this next full meeting. Without a chairman to call sub-committee meetings we didn't hold any, and I think it is fair to say that this particular committee achieved nothing during these twelve months.







The disturbing point about it however, was that nobody on the "full Council" seemed to notice this!

In contrast, the second twelve months seemed very energetic on the Project Committee: we were almost overworked with a liveley and adventurous leadership. This seems to be one of the main faults, in my opinion, of the Parish Council as it functions at present too much depends on this sort of leadership by "random choice". A lot of it's members come along with plenty of enthusiasm but then find that this disappears when they arenot given any real direction as to what they are supposed to do. Perhaps the situation would be improved if each sub-committee was given a clearer idea of what exactly it was meant to do. Personally I feel that there would be more achieved if there were no sub-committees at all and then each of the members of the Council would feel free to contribute to whatever he felt best at without feeling he was treading on someone else's toes etc.

I leave the Parish Council with the impression that it is a good idea in theory, but is not made the best use of in practice. Several of us wonder whether the Parish actually wants a Council. Very few parishioners actually use the Council as a means of voicing their complaints, making suggestions or requestsetc and this leaves many members with the impression that they are only putting forward their own ideas rather than serving as a channel for other peoples ideas.

A new Council will have been chosen by the time this magazine is published. Make use of it. Let your Council members know what you think of life in the parish: anything from the choice of hymns at Mass to the sort of social functions you want. They won't always be able to do something about it but you can be sure it will be brought to Father Peyton's attention. You could also make suggestions as to how you think the Parish Council could be run with more obvious benefits to the parish.

Dear Editor,

Jo Sweeney's letters (issue No. 10) requires support I think. Not only should children be welcome at Mass, they should come in at as early an age as possible. They will learn in time to modify their behavior and keep quiet, at first 'for the people who want to talk to Jesus'. More important, by coming they witness adults praying, and thus will learn to pray.

As well, keeping children out of Mass will not necessarily make it easier when, as older children, they come for the first time. Being quiet and still, is alien to children, way beyond the toddler stage. We also forget, I think, since Mass has been in English, that adult language, and especially the language we must use to describe God, is difficult for children to understand. It is difficult for adults too. How many of us understand every word spoken at With time, and by learning to listen, understanding will develop. Only by being quiet and still can we listen, and only by practise can children learn this difficult skill.

The valid point made by Mrs.Durnan; that mothers of youngsters get little time to listen and pray during Mass, may be answered in two ways. First, I am sure God would never allow a mother to lose grip on her faith in the years she struggles to give that faith to her small children. Second, on a more practical level, might not a mothers' Mass be celebrated from time to time. Volunteer helpers, grans, dads or aunties could baby-sit whilst mums came to the Mass without their little ones. They might even have a night out afterwards!

However, all things work for good for those who love God, said Paul in his letter to the Romans. The problem for us so very often is to see the 'good' and discern the Lord's will in a given situation.


May I state here and now that my view of the situation may not be the correct one, however, I feel strong enough and interested enough at least to beg your attention to a possible way forward.


The basis of my suggestion is 'UNITY', - Much is said about Church unity but little practical work done in our area. It seems to me that for a start we are already united in the area in which we live, work and socialise. In general our hopes and aspirations for the welfare of our community are the same. Our differences in churchmanship are historical, traditional, complicated and sometimes simply personal prejudices. Sadly such things are unlikely to be solved overnight. They can however be overcome by mutual respect and understanding. Perhaps it is in this sphere that the Lord is directing us. Not to building a "Sacred Heart" Parish Centre or "St. Mark's" Parish Centre, or any other denominational Centre, but a Christian Parish Centre to serve the needs of our common community. Surely, an economical project which avoids the more obvious problems of Churchmanship and doctrinal difficulties (which will have to be tackled in due time) yet in a way brings about a real church, the body of believers sharing and working together in the name of Christ.

To Everyone: -

My father-in-law's death shocked us all. He was chatting happily and then minutes later he was dead. We were aware that his heart was weak. Fourteen years ago he had suffered a massive coronary, and during the last year angina seemed to be troubling him. Yet we had not been prepared for this sudden end.

When I told my daughters how Gramps had died, and how he had known no pain, it did seem the best possible way to die. Yet the rest of us, selfishly keep feeling that the very suddeness makes us unable to cope, unable to live. At this time, one has to trust in offering back to God. but few have that perfect faith always to say without bitterness "Not my will, but Thine". I don't think any of us, especially Claire, my mother-inlaw, would have survived the last fortnight though if it hadn't been for prayer: the prayers, the love, the kindness that so many people have shown. Fr Peyton was with us within minutes, and with prayers and his mere presence, he prepared us for the days ahead. Doctor Rebello followed almost immediately, and since that first hour we have been inundated with Mass Cards, messages of sympathy, personal callers and flowers. SEPARATED?
DIVORCED?

Marriages fail for many reasons, some of them obscure and maybe, not even fully comprehended by the parties concerned. The plight of separated and divorced Catholics is a special one, despite the broadening of grounds for annulment in recent years, the majority will never qualify. They know that re-marriage during the lifetime of their former partner would not be recognised by their Church and would debar them from the Sacraments.

The Church now recognises marriage breakdown as a serious social problem. There is a growing realisation that the issues involved are complex and require sympathy and understanding consistent with the Gospel. We can no longer pretend that separated and divorced Catholics are an insignificant minority within the Church. One in three marriages now ends in divorce, but it could be nearer one in two, because separated Catholics are not included in that figure. More and more families are affected by divorce or separation - parents, children and grandparents all feel the pain caused by the breakdown of a marriage.

Committed Catholics also face a crisis of conscience, often resulting in feelings of failure, guilt and rejection. If ever there was an area of need for healing in the I980s' this must surely be a priority. Pope John Paul II speaking in York, during his visit to this country said:-

"We must reach out with love, the love of Christ, to those who know the pain of failure in marriage, to those who know the loneliness of bringing up a family on their own".

What has been lacking is a clear coherent ministry which meets the needs of those who are experiencing or have experienced a breakdown of their marriage. One answer to this was the Association of Separated and Divorced Catholics set up in Manchester in 1981....

- Which provoked the greater discussion in your family or at your place of work fact or fiction? Was it the controversial "Thornbirds" which made the Catholic Church and her priests the subjects of many a heated argument? Or was it the headline story about the disabled man who was refused permission to be married in a Catholic Church? Which is really worth wondering about? fictional controversy can of course be dismissed ultimately, as we shrug our sholders and say that it probably would never happen anyway. Fact however cannot be dismissed so lightly, because what is fact does or did happen. It cannot be ignored.
- Most of the people to whom I spoke on this topic, shared a common reaction when the story first hit the news one of shock and disbelief.

Others even mocked a church which held itself up to such ridicule. There was also a number of people, well-schooled in obedience who were ready to support the Church at all costs. I can even quote a Muslim who said that this priest was to be commended for enforcing the law laid down by his religion.

- In any civilised society laws are essential, for the well-being of the majority, and cannot be twisted to suit the individual. In England we drive on the left and cannot change that law to suit a visiting foreigner for whom it would be more convenient to drive on the right. Obviously allowing the foreigner to drive on the right would endanger many people, but by bending the Church's law on marriage, would the joining of these two people in matrimony have endangered others in any way? The danger, as some people see it, is that once there is a chink in the door, the door is soon thrust wide open. We have only to look at the vast increase in the number of abortions and divorces to see that this does happen.
- Perhaps what that particular priest seemed to lack was compassion. What saddened me was that the couple seemed to be simply a case to be examined and pigeon-holed and dealt with in a bureaucratic fashion. Is it not possible that the laws of the Church are only a guide? Or is it written somewhere in the Scriptures that Christ said that the sacrament of matrimony cannot be administered if there is a possibility that the marriage will not be consumated?

Discrimination between the sexes, discrimination between races, discrimination between creeds and now discrimination between the disabled and the able-bodied -- does every man wishing to marry in church have to proclaim his virility and every woman her ability to bear children? Surely this would all mean that those marriages between elderly couples should never have been allowed.

In all this I am still confused. Yes, I do think that laws are made to be upheld. Yes, I do think the couple should never have been refused a wedding in church.

Two last points still niggle. Firstly, what was this "new medical evidence" which prevented a bishop from supporting one of his priests but saved the face of the Church? Secondly, why, when they had suffered the indignity of making their story public to achieve their goal, were these two people not prepared to stand before God in church to be married?







We are not a Catholic "Gingerbread", a Singles Club or a rebel group within the Church. Our aim is simply to support and encourage Catholics by spiritual programmes, socials and new friendships to get back on their feet, avoid a ghetto mentality, practice their faith openly and free of guilt or anxiety, and eventually contribute to helping others, particularly those in the early stages of their troubles.

Because of the very nature of his/her experience the divorced or separated Catholic can emerge with new personal insights, a profound sense of his faith, a determination to build a 'new life' a deep sense of compassion for others, and contribute greatly to the life of the Church and Society in general.




Well, if we "grown-ups" get a bit rocky, I suspect young people (of all ages) must experience equally worrying times of doom and gloom.








What's it all about?





Ron and Betty are foster parents and over the years they have found places in their home and hearts for so many of the children that society finds hard to place. They are the children who as well as needing a new home, have other problems.

They may be mentally handicapped, maladjusted or they may find it difficult to cope with other people.

When talking about the children she has fostered, Betty finds it very sad that although all children are God's children, so many of them are rejected and unwanted.

Caring for other peoples 'rejects' can be a mixture of happiness and sadness. It can also be tiring, and frustrating, but from listening to Ron and Betty there certainly seems many happy moments to be shared.

One not so happy fact about fostering is that the time may come for a child who has become part of your family has to be returned to his or her parents. This says Betty can be heartbreaking. "You always have to remember that they are not your own children and never will be, so whatever you do, you should not expect anything in return. The satisfaction comes when you see them developing into decent young adults. This is what Ron and I work towards. To develop this in children who often are wary of love and kindness, requires a sense of humour, plenty of patience and most important of all faith".

are now grown up. She said the idea came after reading an article about children in care. "It touched my heart because I realised that we had become so complacent and selfish, when we had so much to offer",

Ron and Betty have cared for many children, some one night stays some a few months. One young teenager has been with them since he was a baby, fifteen years ago!

This interview was inspired by an article that appeared in the Universe a few weeks ago. It was not about foster parents, but about the many children in need of a loving stable environment. Many local authorities "advertise" their children in need. This I find sad, as it makes them look as if they are for sale. What price could you put on these young children? It made me think of Ron and Betty who are "special" in many ways, but their "Specialness" has grown because of their deep faith and their ability to share themselves with so many who need just what they have -

faith, love, and hope.

Perhaps we can all stop and take stock of the many things we possess. We might even find that we have so much to offer, that we too could share our lives with someone less fortunate.






